

Students can progress from this qualification to:

- Higher education courses such as degrees in English, English literature, creative writing or in related subjects such as journalism, teaching, drama and history.
- A wide range of careers either directly related to English language or literature, such as teacher, editor, writer, or in areas such as publishing, journalism, the media, advertising, public relations, arts administration, record offices, libraries, national and local government and the civil service.





Examiners do not 'give away' grades in Advanced level English! You must work hard and be able to have an active role in class discussions, to share with each other your thoughts about the texts presented and to work hard for all three teachers equally both in and out of the classroom. You need the support of all three of your teachers to gain excellent skills on this course and we talk to each other about your commitment and progress so please be aware of this from the outset:

your teachers work as a team, and we want you to be a team too.

- The relevant textbooks you are expected to purchase your own as you will need to annotate it in class.













The examination board will provide you with an anthology which Mrs Barber will use to guide your learning with this component. This is heavy on analysis, terminology and comparison. As the title suggests you will be exploring the importance of the voices in the wide variety of texts explored including Oscar Wilde, Obama, Maya Angelou, Martin Bashir and more.



The iconic drama, A Streetcar Named Desire by Tennessee Williams is studied in year 13 where the constructed voices of characters will be contextualised.






Voice:

YOU WILL NEED TO PURCHASE ANY COPY OF THIS — make sure you also have a bookmark or two or three!






You are expected to familiarise yourself with this novel over the summer holidays.

You may wish to purchase some study guides for this novel to support wider thinking.

Mrs Ash will be guiding you through the reading and contextual analysis under the same overview of the 'Crossing Boundaries' component by exploring Jean Rhys's, The Wide Sargasso Sea novel in year 12.



You will need to purchase these two texts to enable you to annotate whilst discussing it in class.

In year 13 (year 2 of the course) Ms Brightly will be guiding you with your coursework folder which consists of creative writing and analysis. All teachers will be regularly reading this portfolio with you to support its completion, but it is up to you to ensure that the very strict time guidelines are adhered to, and you master all the assessment objectives required for success.



You may wish to purchase study guides to encourage your wider thinking on these texts.

It is recommended that you are familiar with the respective texts at the beginning of year 12 and year 13 retrospectively.

This will provide a firm foundation for your analytical exploration as you springboard into A Level. In addition you will find the following words – together with the ones
